Test marks may be negative. In case of a negative assessment, student is expected to write an essay on a given topic (previously consulted with the teacher). Essays for the first colloquium must be submitted to the release date of the second colloquium and essays for the second colloquium - until the end of classes in the winter semester. The seminar paper should be submitted by the end of classes in the winter semester. Rating of accepted essays is sufficient (D) and is taken into account in the final grade formation. In the case of excused absence from the tests, there are the same obligations as in the case of obtaining a negative assessment of the midterm tests. Unjustified absence implies 0 (zero) grade. Due to specific epidemiological situations (COVID 19 disease) during the exam periods, final oral exams might be organized.
