Course description	The aim of this course is to prepare the students for individual morphological analysis of words in the English language. The students will be acquainted with the basic notions of English morphology, basic theoretical assumptions about the fundamental units in morphology, adopt the rules of various modes of wordformation in English, understand the different approaches to the study of morphology of the English language, its diachronic and psycholinguistic aspects, and the interfaces between morphology and other linguistic branches, such as phonology, syntax, and semantcs. The methods used in this course are: lectures, seminars which involve solving tasks from lectures, a seminar paper with a topic from English language morphology, additional selected readings and using language corpora.
