Two preliminary exams are compulsory for all students. Test marks may be negative. In case of a grade negative assessment, student is expected to write an essay on a given topic (previously consulted with the teacher). The essay for the first preliminary test must be submitted to the release date of the second midterm test and the essay for the second preliminary test - until the end of classes in the spring semester. Rating of accepted essays is sufficient (D) and is taken into account in the final grade formation. In case of excused absence from the tests, there are the same obligations as in the case of obtaining a negative assessment of preliminary tests. Unjustified absence implies 0 (zero) grade.
