

Course description	and MerlinBy moving beyond the perception of popular culture as mere and simple entertainment, this course offers an introduction to a series of analytical approaches (within cultural theory) understanding of which contributes to evaluating the complexity of specific social and cultural phenomena. By analyzing various popular culture examples, this course aims to research and answer the questions such as 'what is popular culture'', ''what is the difference between popular and high culture'' and ''how is popular culture consumed''. With the overview of specific cultural theories, this course offers an analysis of various media and genres within the field of popular culture studies. The course is divided in two cycles, first one is series of lectures and obligatory readings as a part of preparation for the lectures. First 8 terms will consist of only lectures and the reading. Second part of the course will be a series of intense workshops/seminars through which the students will be divided into teams that will present specific text and try to use the findings from lectures and allocated texts on specific obligations within the seminar part of the course. In it, students will have to write group seminar paper, as well as to present one of the texts allocated to the seminar topics. Seminar paper should be submitted 4 days before the date of the final oral exam.Requirements for the final oral exam are submission of the seminar paper, presenting seminar text, being absent less than 4 times (lees that 4 lectures, less than 4 seminars), writing a midterm paper.
