| Course description | The course offers a detailed overview of the structure and constituents of simple and complex sentences in the English language. Furthermore, students are acquainted with different theoretical frameworks by means of which these phenomena are analyzed, primarily within the traditional, transformational-generative and cognitive approaches.
