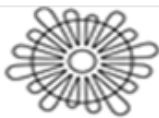

Learning outcomes	Upon finishing this course, the students will be able to: define, explain, and identify the areas and fundamental features, goals, and aims of lexicography as a scientific discipline; recognize the basic types of dictionaries and their characteristics; recognize, describe, interpret, and analyse parts of dictionary macro- and micro-structure; distinguish the features of dictionary macro- and microstructure, and recognize parts thereof in specific examples; interpret, describe and compare the main traits of historical periods in English lexicography and identify the main representative ideas of British and American lexicography (and several other well-renowned lexicographic traditions, e.g. French, Italian, Russian, Croatian); use examples of dictionaries and dictionary entries to compare, identify, evaluate and differentiate the features of some of the most important works in English lexicography; interpret and identify qualitative and quantitative features of dictionaries and lexicographic concepts; critically interpret and evaluate the features of various contemporary mono- and multilingual dictionaries; familiarize themselves with the leading online monolingual English dictionaries; compare and evaluate the accomplishments of English monolingual lexicography and the contemporary Croatian-English and English-Croatian bilingual dictionaries. In the practical part of this course, the students will work on the creation of the macro- and microstructure of a specialized dictionary and will design, prepare, present and recommend their						

	solutions and ideas for creating the entries of such a dictionary. The students will conduct their own research of linguistic data collected via language corpora; analyse and edit the collected data and use the acquired skills to create, plan, suggest, prepare and organize other lexicographic works.

Conditions for permission to take the exam	There are two conditions that a student needs to meet to take the final exam – obtaining a passing grade in both mid-terms and obtaining a passing grade from the seminar. Taking the mid-term is mandatory for all students. The mid-term grades can be negative, in which case the student must write an essay on one of the selected topic(s). When choosing the topic and the appropriate reading materials for it, the students will consult their course instructor. The essay for the 1 st mid-term must be submitted before taking the 2 nd mid-term, and the essay for the 2 nd mid-term must be submitted before the Course end date. In case of justified absences from the mid-terms, the students have the same obligations as in the case of obtaining a failing grade from the mid-term. Unjustified absences will be graded with zero (0) points. A student cannot take the final exam without obtaining a grade from both mid-terms. Due to specific epidemiological situations (COVID 19 disease) during the exam periods, final oral (online) exams might be organized.

Course description	The course provides insight into: the area(s) within the field of linguistics in which the theoretical foundations and practical applications of lexicography are anchored; the main goals and aims of lexicographic research (both theoretical and applied); types of dictionaries and their features; the fundamental issues in lexicography; parts and features of dictionary macro- and microstructure; basic features of key periods in the development of English lexicographic tradition and the main representatives of the British and American lexicography; the current state of lexicographic production of monolingual and multilingual, general, linguistic, and specialized dictionaries of the English language; a comparison of achievements of English and Croatian monolingual and multilingual practice in the 20 th and the 21 st century. The practical part of the course course also offers an overview of different types of language corpora and their use in lexicography, basic and advanced functions for searching the corpora, methods for downloading and editing the corpus-collected linguistic data and using the data in lexicographic activities; an overview of spreadsheet and text processing software, basic and advanced functions for processing and editing corpus-collected data for creating dictionaries and dictionary entries. Through use of these computer methods, the course enables the students to conduct individual research and generate their own lexicographic works.

Calculation of final grade	<p>The final grade is calculated as a mean score of four grades – the grade for the seminar paper, the grade obtained through both mid-terms, and the grade obtained through the final written exam. The seminar paper is designed as a workshop during which the students will learn how to use linguistic corpora in the development of a dictionary, understand the features of dictionary macro- and microstructure, design and organize the basic parts of a hypothetical dictionary which they would create under the guidance of their course instructor, and finally, create several entries with all previously arranged elements of the microstructure. All students will describe their own dictionary entries in front of their colleagues and instructors (the timeline of the creation, the structure of the entry, difficulties they encountered, etc.) and their work will be graded through discussion/analysis of the entries they created.</p> <p>Mid-terms are obligatory for all students. The grades obtained through the seminar paper and the final exam have to be positive, while mid-term grades can be negative. In case of a negative mid-term grade, the student will have to write and submit an essay through which they will show that they understand the materials from which they obtained a failing grade. The essay for the 1st mid-term must be submitted before taking the 2nd mid-term, and the essay for the 2nd mid-term must be submitted before the Course end date. The grade for the accepted essay (satisfactory 2) is final and is taken into consideration when forming the final grade. In case of justified absences from the mid-terms, the students have the same obligations as in the case of obtaining a failing grade from the mid-term. Unjustified absences will be graded with zero (0) points.</p>
